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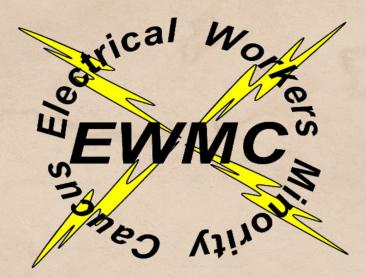

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# Membership Development Report

In August, I had the opportunity to attend two conferences for the local. Both were very informative. Not only do I get to learn while in the conferences or in the training that goes along with them, but also in all the conversations that are had with Brothers and Sisters from all over the country and Canada.

I accompanied 1439's RENEW President Tony Leeker, Jr to the National RENEW Conference. Seeing all the younger Brothers and Sisters from so many diverse backgrounds was extremely inspiring. It gave me a fresh sense of hope for our organization. In the conference they touched on the basics of running a committee and the need for younger members to be involved. There were breakout sessions about having the younger members involved in their communities, local elections, organizing, and being more active in their local Union.

The other conference was the Membership Development Conference. This is the largest yearly conference held by the IBEW. The focus of this conference is organizing and growing the IBEW both internally and externally. Before the conference started, there was a three-day training session called ARC, Assessing and Running Campaigns. The interaction with the trainers and the other participants was informative. During the session we discussed effective plans, labor laws, quality messaging, and digital tools to use.

There were three days of conference. Each day having breakout sessions that offered information on a variety of topics. One of the breakouts was a class on ActionBuilder. This is a program to aid and assist in organizing campaigns. It helps keep track of information with a lot of detail, such as each campaign's progress, individual workers support of the campaign, and mapping of prospective organizing sites.

Another breakout was called "The Art of Organizing". They based this class on an ancient book called "The Art of War". They highlighted 27 steps out of that book to help with the "war" of organizing. That was one of my favorite breakouts by far!

The last breakout was on NLRB updates. With a labor friendly administration in office, that has helped the labor board become more friendly to organized labor. The biggest win with was the firing of Peter Robb, a lawyer who is pro-business and very anti-labor. With that firing and the appointment of more labor friendly people, it has helped swing the pendulum to the side of labor.

With the knowledge I acquired at these two conferences, I hope to help make not only Local 1439 a stronger local but to make the IBEW a stronger organization for our current and future members. Stay safe and I hope to see you at the next meeting!
